A Brief History...

The farm was founded by the Depper (Zepper) family who immigrated to Pennsylvania from the Palatinate region of what is now Germany. They made port in Philadelphia in 1765 and within a few years had settled on land to the north which came to be called Quiet Valley. The small family made their home by digging into the side of a hill and building a single room with a fireplace at one end. More rooms and buildings were added as the years went by with the last major change occurring with the 1890 addition to the house. The land passed out of the family's hands in 1913.

The property was purchased in 1958 by Alice & Wendell Wicks. After due consideration they decided to open a historic farm museum on the site with the help of their daughter Sue and her husband Gary Oiler.

Since 1963 Quiet Valley has been dedicated to preserving the rich history of America's early farming families through educational programs, school tours, special events and public tours.

Teaching – if you have a heritage craft or skill to teach
Demonstrate – Show a traditional skill you know to visitors
Cooking – help make food here at the farm or at home
Guides – train to be a volunteer tour guide
Cleaning – outside work as well as indoors, during spring, fall and after special events
Wood cutting – cut and/or split wood, stack in wood shed (Usually November or December)
Sales people – help in Gift Shop during school tours (April - June; October & early November)
Entertainment – Public singing, storytelling, acting or playing a traditional instrument at special events
Speaker – represent Quiet Valley as a public relations speaker at area events and meetings
Merchandising – make appropriate hand crafted items for regular and special event gift shop
Clerical help – bundling brochures, mailings, data inputting, etc.
Gardening – weeding, planting, bundling flowers for drying, help at Summer Garden Party, seasonal
Farming/Animal care - experience may be required
Craft Training – for men & women who want to learn or develop 19 th century craft skills
Sewing - Help make QV costumes, become part of our quilting group, sew items for gift shop, etc.
Handyman/Carpenter – help with repairs and building projects when they come up, fencing, etc.
Odd Jobs – someone we can call last minute who is willing to help with a variety of things
